
School Supplies Drive

Two Generation Gap

Why are we tracing our roots? I ask myself that question all of the time but the answer is simply put. "The more people know about their origins, the more complete they become." With that said, we are becoming more and more complete each day.

We have done a remarkable job in uncovering and displaying "what we know" via the internet and our family books. What we know is eloquently displayed as 8 generations spanning over 135 years of family members whose lives and stories explain who we are. We define ourselves from the traditions and culture that has helped mold us. We are a proud and prosperous West Indian Family from Jamaica who have continuously raised the bar for ourselves and our

children. We have a great system in place to record our history going forward, however we have exhausted the lineage that we can provide regarding our ancestry from a "recollection" standpoint. Our knowledge has settled us at 1873 in St. Catherine Jamaica, marking the birth of our oldest ancestor on record; Solomon Augustus Hibbert. (Continued on Page 3).

Two Generation Gap (continued)

As Aunt Barbara put it, Solomon and Elizabeth are our "Adam and Eve". To this point, we have no information about the preceding generation.

Not only are we researching to identify the previous generations, we have simultaneously been researching the Hibbert name in general. Researching the name Hibbert has taken us all the way back to the Norman Conquest of 1066.

In 1734, Thomas Hibbert settled in Kingston. With the assistance of slave labor these Hibbert settlers form Great Britain at one time accounted for about 40% of all the revenue raised by the British Government. Coincidentally, we corresponded with a gentleman named Nick Hibbert Steele, a direct descendant of Thomas. Nick has been on a campaign to settle the record about his families role in slavery. He has ad-

vised us that if we can trace two more generation back from Solomon that we would be able to tap into the records that he has. The significance is that Solomon was born approximately two generations after the end of slavery. We have access to slave returns for several of the former Jamaican plantations owned and operated by the Hibbert family. What is our true connection to this family of Hibbert settlers? Are we direct descendants? Are we descendants of an illegitimate Hibbert? Did we adopt the name? Did our people come from West Africa? We will answer all of these questions and more.

The story in our last newsletter about Selvyn Hibbert continues. The brief overview is that Selvyn's father's name is Hezekiah Hibbert. The question about Hezekiah was that we couldn't identify with certainty, if Hezekiah was a brother or cousin to Solomon. We are still trying to make that connection however, the research team on Selvyn's side was recently successful in recovering Hezekiah's marriage certificate which lists his father as John Hibbert. We are also on the case to find our preceding generation. Remember, it is possible that John could be Solomon's father as well. We will keep everyone posted on our search and welcome any assistance or suggestion.

If you would like a record of our genealogy progress, a link called "Summary of Genealogy Search" has been posted on the family website under the "Tings" link.



The Hibbert name originated in Ancient Normandy, however before the evolution of the name which produced variations it was actually Hildebert of Germanic elements meaning "Famous Battle".

5K Initiative

It may be to your church or a charitable organization, but we all do it. Do what, you say? We all donate money for some worthy cause. With that said, we have a proposal. Since we all have the capacity to give, why don't we pool a small portion of our resources and give to an organization that bares our family name? Because of our numbers and proven commitment, it would be relatively easy. Why would we do this? Well...one day I was researching and came across someone by the name of Robert Hibbert. Robert was born in the year 1770 in Jamaica and was a member of the Hibbert family of merchants who made their living manufacturing sugar during the years of slavery. Robert, who referred to himself as a Creole was the

third and posthumous son of John Hibbert, the younger brother of the elder Thomas. Thomas, as many know built what is now known as The Heritage House on Duke Street in Kingston. With much ambition, Robert founded The Hibbert Trust. In the original scheme the trust was called 'the Anti-Trinitarian Fund,' and its object was, by a provision of divinity scholarships, to encourage learning and culture among unorthodox Christians. After reading about Robert, it inspired me. Not so much because we are interested in spreading a form of Christianity, but by the fact that this particular Trust, bares our surname and was successful in awarding scholarships and fellowships. This is where the idea of The Hibbert Family Foundation was born. The vision is that

our family can pool its resources to develop the Foundation which would serve many purposes. Focuses of the Foundation would be to support immediate and future family goals such as offsetting reunion costs and scholarships and represent a funnel to where we could use raised funds to support humanitarian projects in Jamaica. But to do this we need everyone's support and we have to begin somewhere? To start, the Committee has set forth an end of year goal of raising \$5,000. What did you say? That seems like an impossible amount of money for us to raise in such a short space of time? I may be inclined to echo that sentiment if it wasn't for that fact that I am able to put it in a broader perspective.

5K Initiative (continued)

Collectively as a family, we already raised well over \$100,000. This money was given to the Jamaica Grande for rooming and banquet expenses during our two reunions. None the less, we as a family did come together and pool our resources for a common goal. To raise 5K we created a business plan that has two funding sources. The first funding sources will be voluntary yearly contributions. The second source will be fundraisers.

<u>Voluntary Yearly Contributions</u>: Our mailing list includes

200 households. If each household contributes \$25, we can raise \$5000. However we set realistic expectations of \$2,500. We understand that some families will give \$25. Some families may give more and a number of families may not respond. Please understand that this is by no means a mandate. No one is monitoring who gives vs. who doesn't. Regardless of such, the fund will be there to benefit everyone.

<u>Fundraisers</u>: We will have a series of fundraising BBQ's in areas where our family resides.

These BBQ's are designed to raise the other \$2,500.

Once we achieve our goal, the committee will begin the process of implementing proper management. An immediate goal would be to seek not for profit status of our Foundation thus making future contributions tax deductable.

This initiative is truly bold and has many obstacles, but the end result that we are striving for will dwarf the challenges we hurdled to get there.

Not Your Ordinary BBQ

We have a goal of raising \$5,000 by the end of the year. \$2,500 from family dues and \$2,500 by holding fundraiser BBQ's in the three states this summer.

The first BBQ is scheduled for July 5 at Miramar Regional Park in Florida (Flier enclosed). The contacts for this event will be Junior Edwards, Jean Sang, Dawn Hibbert-Wilson and Lorna Hibbert.

The second BBQ is scheduled for August 9th at Eisenhower Park in Long Island, New York. The contact for this event is Kevin Hibbert

The third BBQ is scheduled for September at Red Top Mountain in Cartersville, Georgia. The contact for this event will be Gregory and Nathalie Hibbert.

These BBQ's are a great way to increase awareness about our reunions and a productive way to continue our fellowship and most of all, raise money.

Capable? We are! We all simply need to be on the same page. So when you eat at the BBQ, please keep in mind that we have a bigger goal we are attempting to achieve. A huge component of goal setting is that the goal is realistic and attainable.

We believe we have both realistic and attainable components. The difficult part is putting it in motion. That's where we need your assistance. I have been reminded over and over about the limitations of our family and the fact that we would not comprehend and participate in such bold initiative. But we have a great level of confidence in the capacity of our clan. Our hopes is that we can begin a trend that will create fundraising events in other regions. If we as a family can begin to think of ways to join efforts to raise money, there can be a day that we would all benefit in a big way.





Letter to Dr. Henry Louis Gates

Dear Dr. Gates,

I have watched your work "African American Lives" on PBS and have been extremely impressed by the passion and detail in which you and your staff have researched and presented the historic accounts and lineage of African Americans. The stories are intriguing and also educational. I too have been attempting to trace my history and feel that the Hibbert Family's story would not only fall in line with your previous subjects, but the fact that we are of Caribbean descent would add a valuable perspective of the African American Diaspora to your program. With that said, the Hibbert Family would be honored to be considered as one of your subject families for any future works exploring this topic.

The Hibbert Family is a Caribbean family from Jamaica and we have been mildly successful in answering a few burning questions about our existence. Before we began our research, we knew little about our surname, "Hibbert", which thus has forced us to take a comprehensive approach. We explored the genesis of the name and attempted to intersect it with that of our Jamaican family. We researched the Hibbert origins from the Norman Conquest of 1066 to the 1800's, while simultaneously tracing backwards from the present to my great-grandfather, Solomon Augustus Hibbert of St. Catherine Jamaica born in 1873. Through this journey, we have uncovered many interesting facts about our family. The Hibbert Family has a rich and proud history and a very shameful one.

Similar to your scholarship, we discovered another Hibbert by the name of Nick Hibbert-Steele, a Caucasian man in London England, who was also tracing his family history and the wealth that his family accumulated from the Jamaican sugar trade. We have identified over 700 hundred family members and many others with the Hibbert surname who are also searching for their history. Unfortunately, we have a gap in our research at least two generations wide. There was a time in Jamaica, where a lot of men, left the island to go to Panama to help with the building of the Panama Canal. There are also quite a few who went to Cuba. We are now coming across young generations of Hibberts looking to be connected, but not knowing from whence they came.

From the outward appearance of our investigations, one would say that we have accomplished a great deal. We have. However embedded deep within those two generation gaps lie the most important answers to our lineage. Are we direct descendants of a European Hibbert Family? Or through the Middle Passage did we adopt the Hibbert surname from slave masters? Our research is incomplete and lacks the genealogical aspects that would provide closure. We welcome you to examine the enclosed summary and lineage, and also invite you to visit our website, www.hibbertfamily.com, to gain more insight into our plight and progress.
